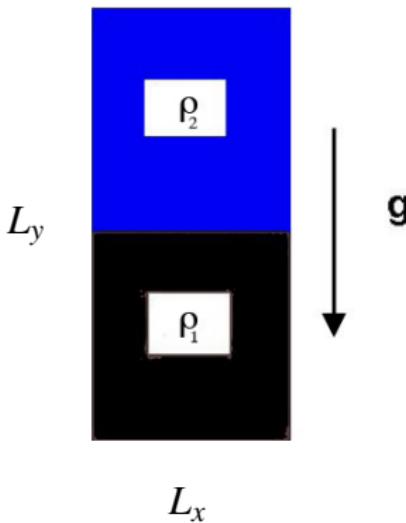

The numerical framework



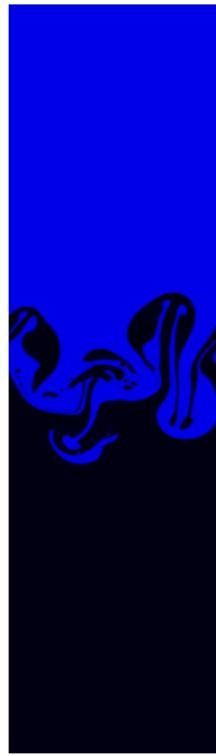
- **immiscible, homogeneous fluids**
(density $\rho_2 > \rho_1$), in gravitational field g
- **two-dimensional case**



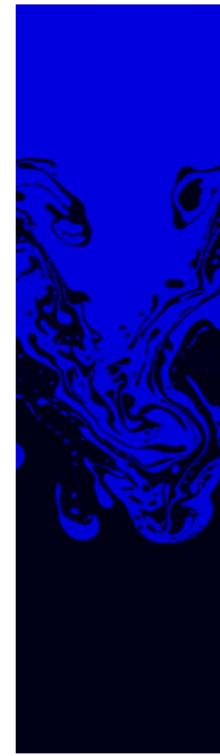

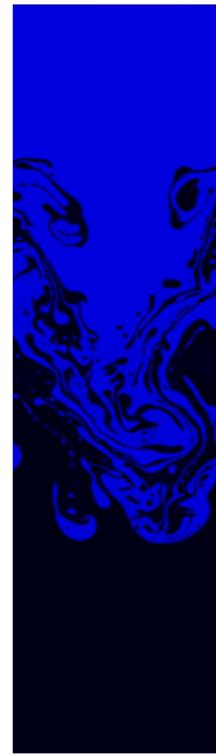

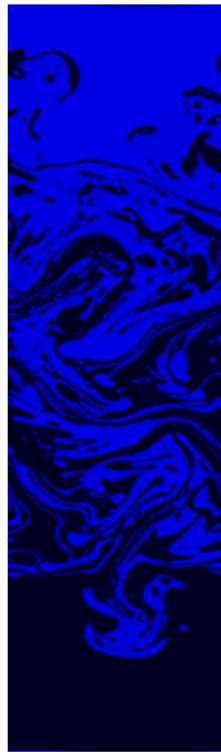
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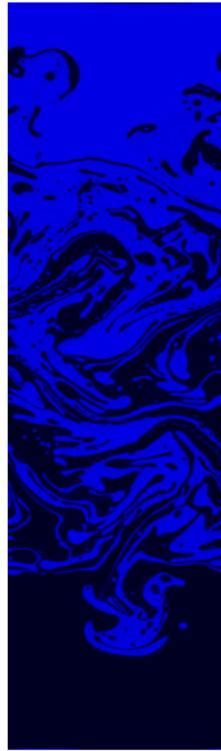
Numerical description: difficulties



- sharp interface
- strong deformation of interface



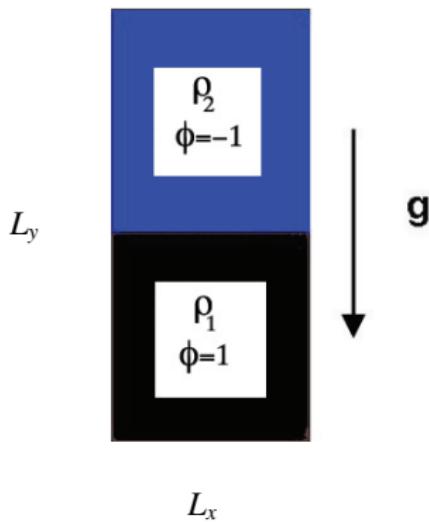
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Numerical description: phase-field model (1)



- sharp interface \Rightarrow diffuse interface
- phase field $\phi(\mathbf{x})$
- Ginzburg–Landau free energy

$$\mathcal{F}[\phi] = \int_{\Omega} \left(\frac{\Lambda}{2} |\partial\phi(\mathbf{x})|^2 + \frac{\Lambda}{4\varepsilon^2} (\phi^2 - 1)^2 \right) dx$$

Numerical description: phase-field model (2)

- equilibrium: $\frac{\delta \mathcal{F}}{\delta \phi} = 0$
 - $\phi(y) = \pm \tanh\left(\frac{y}{\sqrt{2}\varepsilon}\right)$
 - $\sigma = \frac{2\sqrt{2}}{3} \frac{\Lambda}{\varepsilon}$
- out of equilibrium : $\frac{\delta \mathcal{F}}{\delta \phi} \neq 0$

- sharp-interface limit:

$$\varepsilon, \Lambda \rightarrow 0 \quad \text{with } \sigma \sim \frac{\Lambda}{\varepsilon} \text{ fixed}$$

$$\gamma \rightarrow 0$$



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Linear stage: growth rate

$$t = 0: \eta(x, 0) = \eta_0 \sin(kx), \frac{\eta_0}{\lambda} \ll 1 \text{ and } \frac{\eta_0}{\varepsilon} \gg 1$$



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phase-field formulation \Rightarrow
perturbation amplitude:

$$\eta(t) = \eta_0 \cosh(\alpha t)$$

with:

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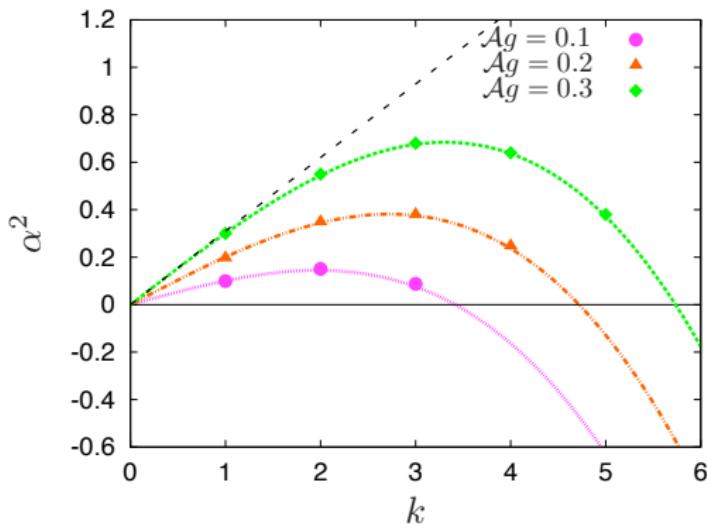

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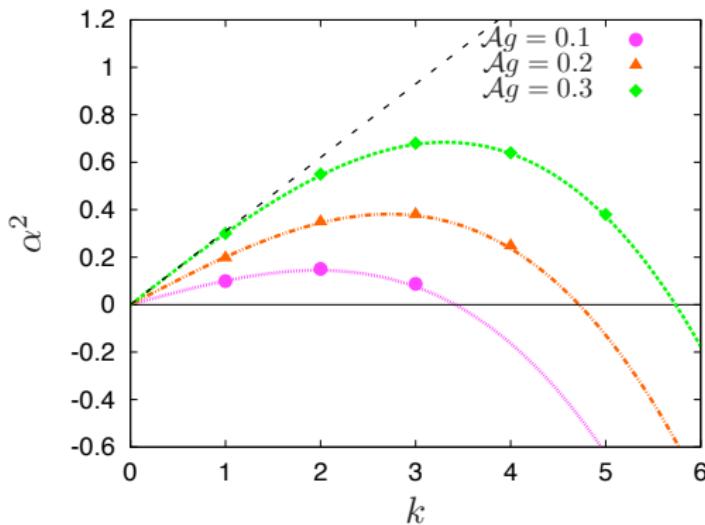
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$\frac{\eta(t)}{\lambda} \sim 0.1 \Rightarrow$ deviations from the linear theory are observed . . .

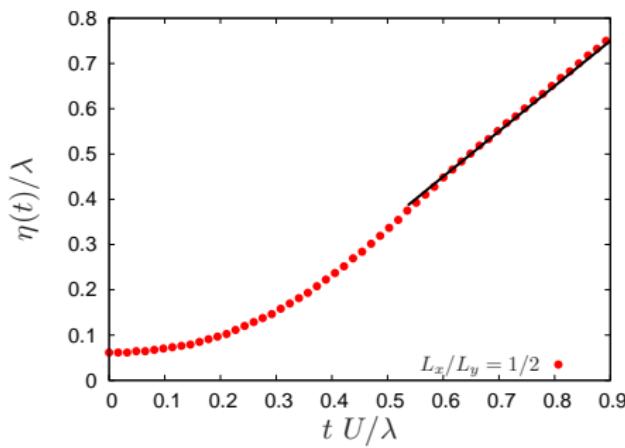
Weakly-nonlinear stage

$$U = \sqrt{\frac{2}{3} \mathcal{A} \frac{g}{k} - \frac{2}{9} \frac{\sigma}{\rho_2 + \rho_1} k}$$

Surface tension effect - 1

- Linear stage:

$$\eta(t) \sim e^{\alpha(k, \mathcal{A}g, \sigma, \nu)t}$$

- Weakly nonlinear stage:

$$\eta(t) \sim U(k, \mathcal{A}g, \sigma)t$$

- Turbulent stage:

$$\begin{aligned} L(t) &\sim \mathcal{A}gt^2 \\ \ell(t) &\sim t^{2/11} \text{ capillary scale} \end{aligned}$$

Miscible configuration: a qualitative idea



Growth rate - 1

- free energy: $\mathcal{F}[\phi] = \int_{\Omega} \frac{\Lambda}{2} |\partial\phi(\mathbf{x})|^2 + \frac{\Lambda}{4\varepsilon^2} (\phi^2 - 1)^2 d\mathbf{x}$
- $h(x, t)$ initial perturbation $\Rightarrow \phi = f\left(\frac{y-h(x,t)}{\varepsilon}\right)$

- locally the interface is in equilibrium: $f'' = V'(f) \Rightarrow$

$$\mu = -\Lambda \frac{\partial^2 f}{\partial x^2} = \frac{\Lambda}{\varepsilon} \left[f' \frac{\partial^2 h}{\partial x^2} - \frac{f''}{\varepsilon} \left(\frac{\partial h}{\partial x} \right)^2 \right]$$

- by linearizing Navier–Stokes equation for small interface velocity ($\nu = 0$):

$$\rho_o \partial_t v = -\partial_y p - \phi \partial_y \mu - \mathcal{A} g \rho_o \phi$$

- integration along the vertical direction:

$$\rho_o \partial_t q_y = \sigma \frac{\partial^2 h}{\partial x^2} + 2 \mathcal{A} g \rho_o h$$

where $q_y := \lim_{L \uparrow \infty} \int_{-L}^L v dy$

- vertical velocity at interface: $\partial_t h = v(x, h(x, t), t) \equiv v^{(int)}(x, t)$



Growth rate - 2

... • relation between v^{int} and q_y

- potential flow: $\mathbf{v} = \nabla\psi \quad \partial^2\psi = 0 \Rightarrow$

$$\hat{v}^{(int)} = \frac{k\hat{q}_y}{2}$$

- in k space: $\partial_t \hat{h} = \frac{k\hat{q}_y}{2} \quad \rho_o \partial_t \hat{q}_y = (-\sigma k^2 + 2\mathcal{A}g\rho_o) \hat{h}$

Growth rate α

$$\partial_t^2 \hat{h} - \alpha^2 \hat{h} = 0$$

where:

$$\alpha^2 = \mathcal{A}gk - \frac{\sigma}{2\rho_o} k^3$$

Growth rate - 3

- ... • the initial condition: $\hat{h}(k, 0) = \delta(k - \bar{k}), \quad \partial_t \hat{h} = 0 \quad \text{at} \quad t = 0$
- the solution: $\hat{h}(\bar{k}, t) = \hat{h}(\bar{k}, 0) \cosh(\alpha t)$
- $\Rightarrow \hat{v}^{(int)}(\bar{k}, t) = -\hat{h}(\bar{k}, 0) \sinh(\alpha t) \Rightarrow \hat{\psi}(\bar{k}, t) = \dots \Rightarrow$
- in \mathbb{R} space:

$$h(x, t) = h_0 \cos(\bar{k}x) \cosh(\alpha t)$$

$$v^\uparrow(x, y, t) \equiv v(x, y, t) = \cos(\bar{k}x) e^{-\bar{k}y} h_0 \alpha \sinh(\alpha t)$$

$$u^\uparrow(x, y, t) \equiv u(x, y, t) = -\sin(\bar{k}x) e^{-\bar{k}y} h_0 \alpha \sinh(\alpha t)$$

for $y > 0$, and:

$$v^\downarrow(x, y, t) \equiv v(x, y, t) = \cos(\bar{k}x) e^{+\bar{k}y} h_0 \alpha \sinh(\alpha t)$$

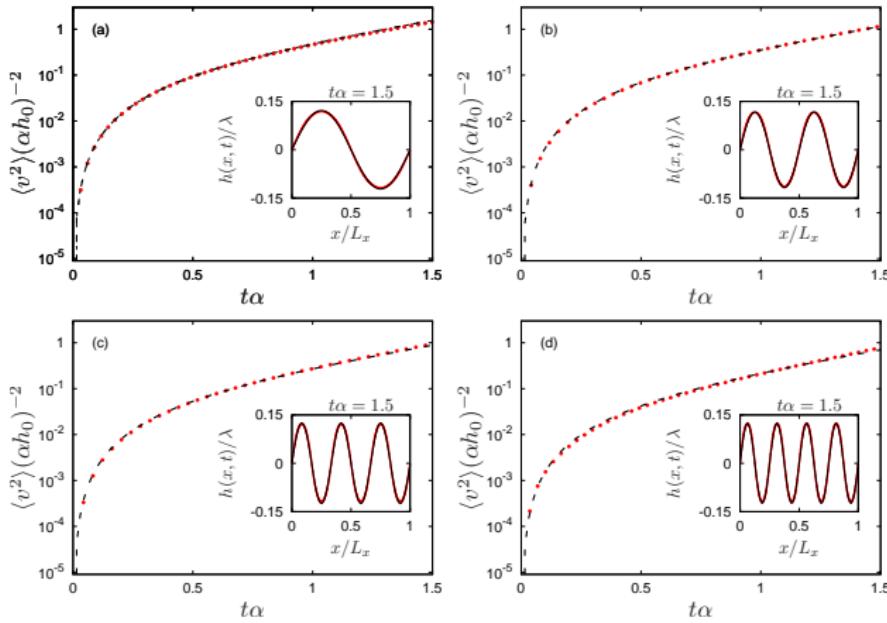
$$u^\downarrow(x, y, t) \equiv u(x, y, t) = \sin(\bar{k}x) e^{+\bar{k}y} h_0 \alpha \sinh(\alpha t)$$

for $y < 0$

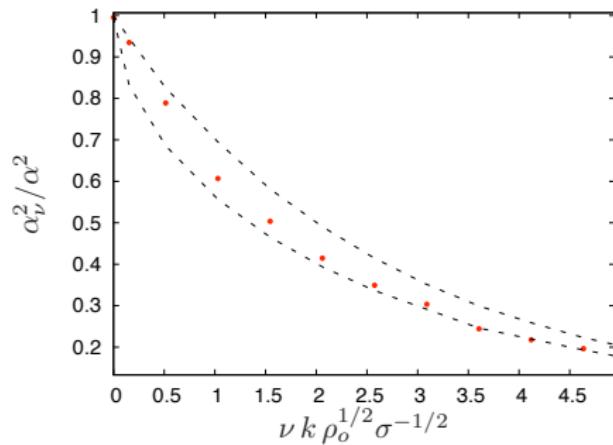


Temporal evolution

$$\langle v^2 \rangle = \frac{1}{2a_y k} [-e^{-2ay} + 1] \alpha^2 h_0^2 \sinh^2(\alpha t)$$



Viscosity effect

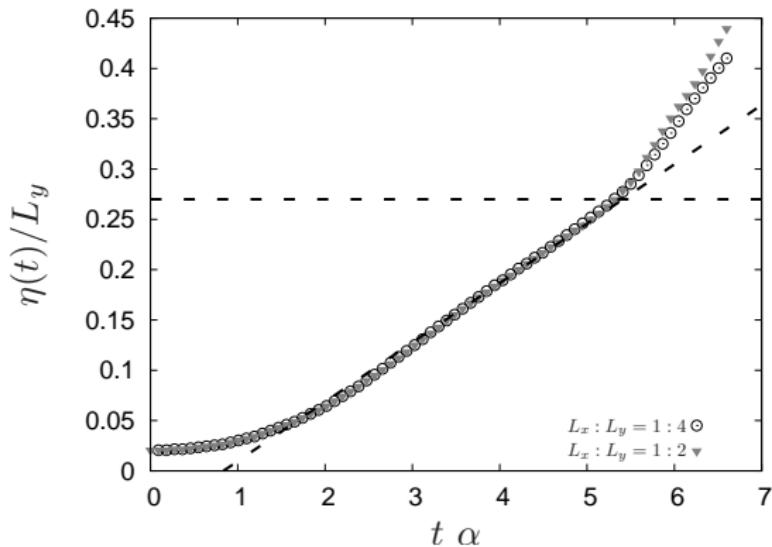


$$\alpha_\nu \equiv \alpha = \alpha(k, \mathcal{A}g, \sigma, \nu)$$

Effect of finite size



$$\alpha = \sqrt{\mathcal{A}gk - \frac{\sigma}{\rho_1 + \rho_2} k^3}$$
